Gardening fever is upon us. It appears everyone is a gardener, even if they live in an apartment. Even if they have eleven green thumbs. Even if they wouldn't pull weeds for a million dollars. Even if they don't know the difference between a spade and a rake. Even if they hate vegetables and bugs, are allergic to bees, or have spring allergies. Suddenly everyone is a gardening maniac.

Are you like me? Well, there are certain things anybody can plant—sweet P's in a straight row, for instance: prayer, patience, peace, passion. But it's not enough for a gardener to love flowers. He or she also must hate weeds. As good plants grow, you pinch off bitter ones like panic, paranoia, and passivity. And by the way, while gardening, we need to squash pride. Devotional: Hooray for Gardening!

Begin now to cultivate your half acre of love. All it takes is a few seeds no larger than grains of sand. Jesus said if you have faith no bigger than the size of a mustard seed, "nothing will be impossible for you" (Matthew 17:20). Today I meet people whose lives flower with the results of tiny deeds of goodness planted year after year. The rest of us harvest the fruit from their lives. Often they haven't got a clue as to how God is using them. They weather storms and droughts and bugs and pestilence, just being faithful. For now, I'll take seedlings on loan from heaven and share the growth. Mint in the pot out my back door perks up any afternoon tea; I can invite a neighbor to share it. Bunches of parsley from the window box to flavor our stew. Any pasta-loving family member will relish fresh basil and rosemary. We can pick tomatoes for a great salad to share at meal time or with a neighbor.

Gardening burns calories, lowers risk of heart attack, slows soil erosion, and provides shelter for a host of microlife. So hooray for gardening! Get your gloves muddy, your face tanned, and your knees crinkled here on earth. Nurture faith and love. Keep believing in the harvest. God will make something beautiful out of your effort and energy.
