2024 Mission Giving

I love my role as conference treasurer! During my tenure, I have experienced so many joys as a member of the Tennessee-Western Kentucky Conference Leadership Team. One of the most fulfilling was receiving news that for the third year we exceeded our mission giving pledge.

Each year, local churches share their budgets with district treasurers to create the district budgets. District treasurers share their budgets with the conference treasurer to create the conference budget and determine the amount the conference plans to pledge to mission giving.

In 2024, the conference pledged \$110,000 in mission giving to support women, youth, and children locally, nationally, and globally. The conference, through the work of the local units and the district treasurers, exceeded the pledge by giving \$130,357.

Thanks to the amazing district treasurers; Beth Adams, Gail Eubanks, Marie Lamon, Valerie Lavery, Michelle Martin, Debbie Miller, Beverly Mintmire, Jan Nutter, and Stephanie Terry, for your efforts in support of TWK UWF. By the way, Marie, Valerie, Jan, and Stephanie were new district treasurers, who stepped into their new roles with enthusiasm.

It is truly a joy to work with such a remarkable group of leaders! In the aftermath of disaffiliations, *TWK United Women in Faith, has continued the work of creating safe and healthy spaces for women, youth, and children. To God be the glory!*

Practicing Hope – Mission u 2025

"Hopelessness is when you stop fighting." Senator Raphael Warnock

To hope is to keep going when the outcome is uncertain. It's getting out of bed on the tough days, making that phone call, showing up for someone else, or simply choosing to pray when the words don't come easily.

Education for Mission -

Gum Moon: A Novel of San Francisco Chinatown - Jeffrey L Staley

In 1898, three-year-old Chinese-American girl Mei Chun Lai is sold to a cruel brothel keeper, where a sympathetic prostitute befriends her. Two years later, at the height of a plague quarantine, a young Methodist woman rescues Chun and places her in a home for abused and trafficked girls. The home is destroyed in the 1906 earthquake and fire. Chun (aka "Maud") and a group of seven other Chinese children embark on a cross-country singing tour to raise funds to rebuild. When their home matron suffers a breakdown, 13-year-old Maud must lead the band of children home.

Based on a true story.

Leadership Development -

Becoming - Michelle Obama

Michelle Obama has emerged as one of the most iconic and compelling women of our era. As First Lady of the United States of America— the first African American to serve in that role—she helped create the most welcoming and inclusive White House, while establishing herself as a powerful advocate for women and girls and standing with her husband as he led the nation. In her memoir, Michelle Obama chronicles the experiences that have shaped her—from her childhood on the South Side of Chicago to her years as an executive balancing motherhood and work to her time spent at the world's most famous address.

Nurturing for Community -

Before We Were Yours - Novel - Lisa Wingate

This riveting, wrenching and ultimately uplifting tale is based on one of America's most notorious real-life scandals—in which Georgia Tann, director of a Memphis-based adoption organization, kidnapped and sold poor children to wealthy families all over the country. The narrators are present-day attorney and heir apparent to her father's Senate seat, Avery Stafford, and Rill Foss, a young girl growing up with her siblings on her family's Mississippi River shanty boat in the 1930s.

Social Action -

Small Great Things - Novel - Jodi Picoult

During a routine checkup on a newborn, labor and delivery nurse Ruth Jefferson is told that she's been reassigned to another patient. The parents are white supremacists and don't want Ruth, who is African American, to touch their child. When the baby goes into cardiac distress the next day while Ruth is alone in the nursery, a gripping series of events unfold that will lead readers to question everything they know about privilege, power and race.

Sleep, Pray, Heal: A Path to Wholeness & Well-Being (Healing Memoir Book 1) - Donna Fado Ivery

When a two-hundred-pound glass partition fell on Donna Fado Ivery's head resulting in brain injury, disability, and chronic pain, she could no longer count on walking, speaking, or thinking. How would she care for her infant, her preschooler, her husband, and herself? How would she continue to serve as pastor? With humor and humility, this inspirational memoir speaks to Donna's struggle through medical, social, and church prejudice with the abiding support of family and the Holy Spirit. *Sleep, Pray, Heal* charts the path through hardship and despair and offers a map—through scripture, theology, poetry, painting, and storytelling—to faith, healing, recovery and wellbeing. *Sleep, Pray, Heal* shares good news in a novel way.

BONUS: 2025 Leadership Development -

A Right Worthy Woman: A Novel – Ruth P. Watson

Based on the inspiring true story of Virginia's Black Wall Street, A Right Worthy Woman tells the story of the indomitable Maggie Lena Walker, the daughter of a formerly enslaved woman who became the first Black woman to establish and preside over a bank in the United States. She went from schoolteacher to secretary-treasurer of the Independent Order of St. Luke, founder of a newspaper, a bank, and a department store where Black customers were treated with respect. Bestselling novelist Patti Callahan Henry calls this a "remarkable and stirring" work.

BONUS: 2025 Nurturing for Community -

All That Is Secret (An Annalee Spain Mystery) – Patricia Raybon Tyndale

This is the first book in the Annalee Spain Mysteries, an exciting "history mystery" featuring a young Black theologian—a fan of Sherlock Holmes—who solves crimes during Colorado's dangerous 1920s Klan years. In the winter of 1923, Professor Annalee Spain receives a cryptic telegram calling her home to Denver to solve the mystery of the murder of her beloved but estranged father. For a young Black woman, searching for answers in a city ruled by the KKK could mean real danger. Still, she launches her hunt for clues, attracting two surprising allies and following clues that land her among Denver's powerful elite.

Harpeth River ~

The Harpeth River District held their spring event, "Woven in Faith," on March 22nd at Brentwood UMC. The ladies at Brentwood were wonderful hosts and we thank them for their hospitality. We were very fortunate to have District

Superintendent B.J. Brack available to share some incredible news with us. The week previous he and a group of volunteers from the three episcopal areas served by Bishop Graves spent a week in the mountains of Western North Carolina to mark the beginning of the renovation of Reeves Chapel UMC into a long-term disaster recovery site. The few, but generous, members donated the church to the conference for disaster recovery efforts. What a selfless act of the twelve church members and a blessing to the area.

Kari Collins, the recently retired Executive Director of Red Bird Mission, traveled from Kentucky to be with us and updated us on the many good works happening in the area. Red Bird Misson, founded in 1921, is the largest and most comprehensive National Mission Institution. She shared the history of Red Bird as well as stories about students at the school, employees, and community members benefiting from their outreach. She spoke lovingly of her late husband Taylor, who was born at Red Bird Hospital, graduated from Red Bird School, and who in 1975 became its principal. They met at Red Bird in 1977, moved to Texas for a number of years, and then returned when he took the job in 2010 as the Executive Director until his death in 2015. His motto for the school was: "Enter to learn. Leave to serve." She asked that we all continue to pray for, spread the word about, and come visit Red Bird Mission.

The event was heartwarming and made me think of 1 Peter 4:10 (NIV): "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

Metro ~

With spring approaching, and Easter around the corner, our focus as a district was on our Social Action event, held Saturday, March 29. Love in Action – Helping Children in the Memphis Metro Area.

Collectively as United Women in Faith, we are called to take social action to make positive changes for Christ in our communities. An area of immediate need of help is the food insecurity of children here in the Metro District. Nearly 1 in 3 children in the Memphis area go home from school to little or no food. How can this be? Where do you start to address this problem? What if your church or unit of UWF is small? Can you make a difference with a crisis of this magnitude? The answer is YES! As United Women in Faith, we are a powerful, fearless force, driven by God's love, and united in sisterhood, with our focus on women and children in need.



Despite the rainy morning, over seventy women came to learn about what's happening and how we can help make a difference. The event was free, but time spent together as sisters in Christ, invaluable. UWF members and non-members alike joined us as we partnered with Mid-South Food Bank for an informative program featuring speakers from every phase of providing for children in need. Mid-South Food Bank's Child Nutrition Manager shared with us the many programs they have developed to reach children affected by poverty and lack of food, while a Community School Resource Liaison explained how she has built trust with these students, and personally sees they receive much needed food and other basic necessities. We also heard from a United Women in Faith member who shared her story of bringing the issue of food insecurity to her home church. What started with just a few volunteers, has grown into church-wide support with not only financial giving, but bi-weekly teams of volunteers packing meals at the food bank's distribution center.

Although the primary goal of the event was education and ways to get involved, it was important for those gathered to have an immediate impact. Attendees were asked to bring a donation of food items used in children's programs of Mid-South Food Bank. Items such as, Tuna Pouches, Mac and Cheese Cups, Granola Bars, Rice Krispy Treats, Cups of Peanut Butter (Jif), Instant Oatmeal packets, and Instant Grits packets were collected. We were overwhelmed by the generosity demonstrated that morning. Again, women were bringing their donations in the rain, to ensure God's children were cared for. As a result, over 388 pounds of food were delivered to the food bank! God is good!



Next up for Metro District are revisions to our bylaws, as we implement changes provided by the National Office for 2025. New guidelines for elected and appointed positions in leadership will be beneficial for both the district and local units. We look forward to the positive impact these changes will have on our organization.
